#### 2.2 Problem analysis and lessons learned

#### 2.2.1 Description

The proposed activity addresses: 1) the lack of a comprehensive policy towards health, sexual and reproductive rights for youth and women, specifically the most vulnerable groups. 2) the rising exposure to high risk behaviour and health problems amongst 15-30 year olds in Iran. 3)the rising cases of HIV/AIDS amongst Iranian youth. 4) the rising use of drugs, specifically amphetamine type stimulants and injectable drugs amongst the most vulnerable youth and 5) the lack of social and political participation of Iranian youth and vulnerable groups.

The proposed activities aim to tackle abovementioned problems by: 1) strengthening capacity and improving coordination of most involved Iranian Ministries and improving inter-sectoral coordination in the development in developing and implementing programmes. 2) developing of programmes and training of staff of existing centres to offer programs on health and reproductive rights. 3) establishing two new centres for girls focused and 4) developing materials and training staff to advance social and political participation of youth.

The interventions explicitly tie in with the SDG's and to Iran's national development plan.

#### 2.4 Cooperation, harmonisation and added value

The proposal is unique in the sense that it has been submitted by three UN organisations operating in Iran: UNFPA, UNICEF, UNAIDS. In addition to the close cooperation and joint implementation by these organisations, they coordinate their work with that of the UNDP, WHO, WFP and UNESCO in Iran. Furthermore, the proposal includes close partnerships with various Iranian ministries; Ministry of Health & Medical education, Ministry of Education, Ministry of Youth & Sports, Ministry of Cooperatives, Labour and Social Welfare and Ministry of Science. Cooperation with these ministries will take place at both national and provincial levels. Finally the three implementing organizations will coordinate their work with 5 local NGO's on a regular basis.

#### 2.5 Channel and aid modality (including alignment)

- The chosen aid modality is a financial contribution to a multilateral institution. This is appropriate for the implementation of this programme.
- The chosen aid modality and channel is the most appropriate for the implementation of this programme. This assessment is based on the level of knowledge, access to key decision makers in Iran as well as technical expertise available in the chose organisations.
- Receiving organizations will not contribute financially to the programme. However, the receiving organizations are pooling their resources and networks for the implementation of this programme. Furthermore there is confirmed buy-in from the Iranian government as well as commitment to contribute to the programme financially and in terms of capacity, once the financial support of The Netherlands has ended.
