II. APPRAISAL OF THE ACTIVITY

2.1 Contribution made by the activity to BZ policy objectives (policy relevance)

2.1.1 Description policy relevance

The project responds to the lack of accessible journalism on human rights and religious issues in Jordan and the particular need for this type of reporting at community level within governorates outside of Amman.

As such, the project is aligned with the GoN's priorities identified in the Dutch Human Rights Policy. It targets specific priorities on Freedom of Expression and Internet Freedom, and Freedom of Religion.

The project also corresponds to the long-term objectives as mentioned in the Human Rights policy area of the MACS: a) freedom of expression and internet freedom, b) equal rights for women and men. It meets the specific criteria set out for the Human Rights Fund and the Human Rights priorities identified in the annual plan.

The Embassy of the Netherlands aims to promote freedom of expression, internet freedom and independence of press in the traditional and new media. Digital mass media receives particular attention because it has the ability to foster freedom of expression, political participation and democratic processes. The Netherlands is highly aware that it is important to strike a balance between promoting national and international digital security and freedom of the press.

2.2 Problem analysis and lessons learned

2.2.1 Description

According to **Reporters without Borders (RSF)**, Jordan ranks number 128 out of 180 countries in the world rankings in 2020 in terms of press freedom. Jordan's media is limited by the restrictions and red lines set by the authorities. In particular journalists are subject to close surveillance by the intelligence services and they must be affiliated with the state-controlled Jordanian Press Association.

Despite all of these challenges and more, Arab Reporters for Investigative Journalism (ARIJ) persists in its core mission to deepen the ecosystem of investigative journalism in Jordan and the Arab world. However, in order to adequately report on digital rights, human rights violations and religious issues, **future generations need an advanced understanding of the law, courage, more awareness, and most importantly, enhanced skills to cover these challenging issues**. By developing technical skills, more cases of **human and digital rights abuses and religious rights** will be exposed, and pressure will be put on authorities to address them.

The project will reach out to all universities in Jordan to recruit the first 100 participants that will be the core of the ARIJ Investigative Incubator. The project will target the following governorates: Ajloun, Amman, Aqaba, Balqa, Irbid, Jerash, Kerak, Ma'an, Madaba, Mafraq, Tafilah and Zarqa. Twenty of those 100 participants plus 10 investigative journalists will be further trained, mentored, and coached to produce local and cross-border investigations that will be published in local, regional and international platforms. They will also participate in ARIJ's annual forum and compete in ARIJ's annual awards.

2.3 Objectives (outcomes), results (outputs), activities and resources, based on the SMART principle

2.3.1 Description

Overall Objective:

To contribute to a sustainable ecosystem for professional and quality journalism in Jordan through ARIJ's Investigative Incubator.

Outcomes:

- Innovate and raise the capacity of 100 students, fresh graduates, and professors/lecturers from different universities in Jordan, as well as journalists, on human rights and accountability journalism through training of various technical skills:
 - Equip **100 media students**, including fresh graduates, 10 lecturers and journalists with new skills to carry out investigations and content research through offering **two offline in-cubators/workshops** as well as **10 days webinars over 10 months**.
 - Produce **30 series of podcasts** by participating students.
 - Conduct **two roundtables** with external audience and experts to raise awareness and create discussions about 20 of the produced podcasts.
 - Provide **25 one-to-one e-clinic sessions** on **digital security** for the 100 selected participants.
- Train, equip, host and coach the **top 20 selected participants** to produce high quality content and to network through various local platforms:
 - Provide a 6-month fellowship for the 20 selected Jordanian participants with advanced skills to produce 10 high-quality investigations on 5 different Jordanian media platforms.
 - Support the selected **20 participants** to attend the **ARIJ annual forum** in 2021 and compete in ARIJ prizes in 2022.
 - Conduct promotional campaigns with Jordanian media houses, radio stations, publishing platforms (digital and print newspapers) with the aim of establishing a baseline and promoting future collaboration/publication of investigations.
 - Produce **20 data journalism stories** and conduct **two roundtables** with external audience and experts to raise discussion on issues included in the data journalism-produced stories.
- Host and mentor the **top 10 participants** to collaborate on and showcase **cross border highquality investigations** and to network, as well as raise awareness through various platforms and opportunities:
 - Mentor, coach and provide 6-months fellowship for 10 participants (out of the 20) to produce four cross-border high-quality investigations.
 - Equip the 10 selected participants with new skills through **3 one-day incuba-tors/workshops**.
 - Collaborate with local, regional and international publishing houses to publish the produced investigations.
 - Support the selected 10 participants to attend the ARIJ annual forum in 2023 and compete in ARIJ prizes in 2023 forum.
 - Support selected participants to be speakers on local radio stations, at CSOs, at local shelters and to travel to conferences as relevant.
 - Conduct **two roundtables** to discuss the 10 produced investigations.

2.4 Cooperation, harmonisation and added value

ARIJ will work with universities and media outlets throughout the project timeline. Specific outreach campaign will be conducted to select the 100 participants in the project activities. In addition, collaboration with media platforms is envisioned to publish produced reports and stories. The project will also support the annual ARIJ forum, which gathers participants from different media organisations, CSOs, and independent journalists.

The Embassy of the Kingdom of the Netherlands is currently supporting organisations like SOWT, 7iber and Journalists for Human Rights. The support was primarily allocated to improving freedom of expression, training journalists and expanding the human rights dialogue in the country. These previous projects reconcile with and provide a good basis for the themes of ARIJ's intervention. Moreover, the Embassy is an active member of many donors' coordination groups such as the EU Human Rights working group, and is coordinating closely with other donors like EU, FR and DK on the topics of this intervention.
